


PREFACE

The Chinese have a proverb that states, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with one step". The first step in pursuit of the genealogy of the Hollopeter family kept us stepping until we had entered, through correspondence, four continents, many foreign countries, and all but five of the United States of America. Considering that the records we secured of the American branch of the family cover but little more than two hundred years, it seems astounding that our family tree has extended itself over so much territory.

From 1890 to 1892, my father, Brenton Silas Hollopeter (Indiana), interested himself in learning something about his family history and its connections. Since he added nothing to his records after those two years, they were quite meager. However, they gave us a starting point, and were of much value because they indicated who the head of the family was, where he had located and the names of seven of his children. They told, too, of the places to which his five sons went when they left their native York County, Pa., and gave names and addresses which brought us into correspondence with some of their descendants. Had all our letters brought response this record would have been more complete.

We were fortunate that Mrs. Chester Burris, of Hamburg, N. Y., my cousin, and co-compiler, had access to the Grosvenor Genealogy Library of Buffalo, and was willing to delve through early history of Pennsylvania, to ferret out any bit of information pertinent to the family. She had the inspiration to write to the York County Historical Society which resulted in the employment of the Society's librarian, John D. Kilbourne, for research. He was able to find official records which were authentic, and to locate the grave of Matthias I. records which were authentic, and to locate the grave of Matthias I.

My own efforts were directed toward learning of the descendants of the five sons of Matthias. If there are errors or omissions, they were in the records sent to me, and we regret them. We are most appreciative of the help of those who sent in information about their families. Perhaps a later historian will be able to build upon the foundation we have established.

EDITOR'S PREFACE

My interest in the family genealogy evolved after I learned the records were being compiled by my cousin, Eva Ridenour of Wabash, Indiana. Whether from love of family, pride or plain egotism is a question of individual opinion, but I have gleaned from this study a knowledge of genealogy and history of our country that otherwise would have passed me by.

When I found the name of Mathias Hollopeter of Warrington Township, County of York, Pa. in the first tax lists made after the Revolutionary War, I knew we had him located and it awakened my interest in York County history. The county was laid out with York as its seat in 1749, five years before Mathias took out his land grant. The courthouse at York was built in 1756, two years after Mathias was living there. During the crucial years of the Revolutionary War, 1777-1778, this courthouse served as the Capitol of the American Colonies and the press of Benjamin Franklin was moved from Philadelphia and upon it was printed \$10,000,000 in Continental bills or the first American money. was printed \$10,000,000 in Continental bills, or the first American money.

York itself had about 300 dwellings and it had been named by William Penn either for the Duke of York or the English city. The "Good Quaker Penn', lived in nearby Bucks County, and Pennsylvania had but three other counties, Lan-

caster, Chester and Philadelphia.

Gen. John Forbes in his campaign of 1758 against Ft. Duquesne used York and its environs as a source of supply. Mathias was then serving his country for he was Collector in 1770 and was Constable of Warrington Township in 1776. (Record of York County Historical Society.)

Any of the family who has visited the home of William Penn in Bucks County, which is open to tourists, has seen his still and brew house and will understand that the stills in Hollopeter and Roose families were not unusual and many families owe their survival to these "Gentleman Stills". It served them medically and as a weapon against the Indians, but did have an effect on their taxes as always Mathias paid the highest in his township.

The Lower Bermudian Union Church, which they attended is now in Adams County with Gettysburg as its seat. This county was created in 1800 and contains portions of what were then Warrington, Monaghan and Huntington Town-

We found no Allegiance signed by Mathias, but Frederick Roose (his fatherin-law) took his oath the day he arrived in Philadelphia from Germany in 1750. This oath was required by all but British subjects after 1720. It required that one be Protestant, had partaken of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, subscribed to the oath passed by Parliament during the 13th year of the reign of King George the 2nd. One then became a subject of Great Britain and entitled to settle in any of His Majesty's Colonies in America.

It has been difficult to relinquish our Holland Dutch heritage, inbred in us all, but we have followed facts and without doubt Mathias did sail from Holland, as did all Germans for they had no other port. Our name as we use it could not be found in Europe but the logical explanation is the fact that Germans at that time were called by their family names first and Christian names last. We found Haller, Holler and Halle as German names and Peter and Mathias usual Christian names, but Germany has no record of vital statistics of that era other than church records. R. W. Davidson, a descendant of Mathias, while searching church records for the Latter Day Saints, could find nothing concrete, so we will print only facts as we found them.

The sons of Mathias married girls of their neighborhood as we note their The sons of Mathias married girls of their neighborhood as we note their father's name on the original land grant map of what was then Warrington Township. Elihu Underwood Esq. who was one of the administrators of both the will of Mathias and Frederick Roose was the beloved schoolmaster, and also is on the original land grant map. Mathias made his will in 1792 when Washington was serving the third year of his eight years as President. Both died the same

year, 1799.

There is an absence of the Hollopeter name in the Revolutionary War rec-

ords. Mathias himself was too old to serve and his sons too young. Anyway, they were now subjects of Great Britain, and the Germans that had taken the oath were reluctant to serve the military forces.

Richard Blatchford, English Quaker father of the Blatchford twins, was called to serve the Revolutionary forces but when he'd attend muster he would be fined by the Quakers and if he didn't attend muster he would be fined by be fined by the Quakers and if he didn't attend muster he would be fined by

the government. The fines were heavy so he lost his land and died in bankruptcy. He had another daughter, Nancy, and a son, Abraham.

Abraham was disowned by the Quaker Church in 1803 for marrying out of unity with the church and for attending muster. He moved from York County to Alleghany County, Pa.

At the time of Mathias' death Richard was in debt to him for 14 pounds sterling; also his son-in-law John Green owed him 10 pounds.

We are listed in historical societies as "Early German Pioneers". Mathias signed his will in German, and his tombstone has the German "Hier lige beg raben" or "here lies the body of". The signature on his will, the only one extant, is in German.

When we think of the work-hardened hand that used the quill pen it makes us wonder if we are worthy. It matters little how he spelled his name for the body of the will carries the name Hollopeter as it was adopted by most of the family. What does matter is that he was the sturdy oak that stands as a monument to us lesser acorns.

His outstanding taxables before the United States had an established bank is our lesson in thrift. He was a religious man who went to church and had his children baptized. He was moral and bade his daughters be discreet and commanded his sons to marry with the approval of their mother. He was respected for he was chosen Collector and Constable. His business acumen is manifest in his will; his fairness proven when he refused to serve a summons on his neighbor in an English Court during a crucial year of the Revolutionary War and took a guilty plea and a court fine rather than do so. How little we comprehend the hardships that our forefathers endured in their vast job, for first they had to build the tools, before the job could be done.

All of my era recall with nostalgia our reunions when our parents came laden with baskets of their favorite foods. In the afternoon there were service and prayers and time for family gossip. An outstanding feature is our sense of humor and love of fun. True, we have our vicissitudes, but the home is happy and seldom does strife prevail. I can't recall a meal with any branch of the family that we didn't first say, "We thank Thee, Lord". We have all been taught alike to live with ourselves and that all things natural in nature, and in life, are "God's way of showing us". We all repeat from our Fathers, pearls that polish our minds.

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CHAPTER I

MATTHIAS HOLLOPETER

The emigrant ancestor and founder of the American branch of the Hollopeter family was Matthias Hollopeter. From his gravestone we learned that he was born in 1728. The year of his arrival in America is uncertain. That he was here in 1754 is confirmed by records found in Pennsylvania archives of that year. It amazes one that so large a number of descendants should have stemmed from him in little more than two hundred years. The tradition that he had come from Holland had long been held, but research failed to substantiate that tradition. To try to determine the country of his origin, a letter sent to the Central Office of Statistics, in Holland, brought the reply that neither from the cards of a million persons who had died in Holland since 1940, nor in the Office of Genealogy, could the name Hollopeter be found. That office was convinced that Hollopeter was not a Dutch name. A part of the tradition was that Matthias had been sent to America by his parents in order to escape military conscription. Switzerland and Germany were countries which imposed conscription, so letters were sent to the Consulate-General of Switzerland and the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Germany. The reply from Switzerland stated that Hollopeter was not a familiar name in that country. The Bureau in Germany reported that they had no official records before 1874, and that records before that time were only church records kept in the local communities throughout Germany. The Bureau suggested that it might be fruitful to contact the Department of Genealogy of the Church of the Latter Day Saints in Salt Lake City, Utah. It did not prove to be a fruitful source for us

A search through books about Pennsylvania history found in the Genealogical Department of the Grosvenor Library of Buffalo, New York, revealed that the immigration from Germany into Pennsylvania in the first half of the Eighteenth Century was in excess of that from all other countries. Many of these Germans, after taking the oath of allegiance to the British crown, had pushed their way North to the farmlands of Lancaster, Bucks and York Counties. These counties comprised an area so fertile that it later became known as the bread basket of the Revolutionary War. York County had been settled originally by the English, Scotch and Irish. They became outnumbered by the Germans. According to Gibson's History of Pennsylvania, Warrington Township, of York County, had been all settled by Germans. That Matthias Hollopeter was one of those settlers was substantiated by the tax lists of Warrington Township, found in the Pennsylvania archives. Correspondence was entered into with the York County Historical Society, and through its Librarian, John C. Kilbourne, whom we employed from time to time as a researcher, we learned of his land grants and purchases, his marriage, of the baptism of some of his children, tax assessments, record of his service as Constable and Collector, a copy of his will, an inventory of his estate, and the location of his grave.

The first official record concerning Matthias is recorded in the York County Court House Land Papers, 4352, which reveal that he was issued one hundred acres of land by the Proprietaries at Philadelphia on April 4, 1754. The warrant for the transaction was directed to the Surveyor-General, Nicholas Scull, as

follows:

"Whereas, Matthias Hollerpeter, of the County of York, hath requested that we would grant to him to take up One Hundred Acres of land, near William Dodd's on Dead Run, in Warrington Township, in said County of York, for which he agrees to pay at the rate of Fifteen Pounds, Ten Shillings, One Half Penny rent for every acre thereof. These are therefore, to authorize and require you to survey, or cause to be surveyed unto the said Hollerpeter, at the place aforesaid, according to the methods of townships appointed, the said quantity of One Hundred Acres, if not already appropriated or surveyed, and make return, thereof, into the Secretary's office in order for further confirmation for which this shall be your sufficient Warrant, which survey, in case the said Matthias Hollerpeter fulfil the above Agreement within six months from the date thereof, shall be valid, and seal the Land Office by virtue of certain powers from the said Proprietaries of Philadelphia this fourth day of April, Anno Domini, 1754.

(Signed) James Hamilton. From this purchase we deduct that Matthias was a man of some means, and not an emigrant from the Palatinate area in Germany, as those emigrants ar-

rived without much, if any, means, and were indentured for a period of time. Matthias was married to Barbara Rusz, daughter of Frederich and Catharina Rusz on November 30, 1754 in the Saint Matthew's Lutheran Church of Hanover, Pennsylvania. The record of their marriage is the second official document found concerning Matthias. This record is in the handwriting of a clerk, who was responsible for the spelling of their names as "Barbara" Rusz and Mattheis Hollingpretter". In early documents and records names were often mis-spelled by clerks or recorders. This is not too disturbing for it is more important to have dates, history and locations correspond than the spelling of names.

Matthias and Barbara were the parents of five sons and five daughters. The birth dates of the first four children were secured from the baptismal records found in the Lower Bermudian Union Church-on the Lutheran side of the

records, and they are as follows:

On February 19, 1759, Barbara Hollopeter was born to Matthias and Barbara (Ruoss Hollopeter. She was baptized November 18, 1759, with Johan Adam Herman and wife Elizabeth as sponsors.

On January 17, 1763, Catharina Hallerpeter was born to Mattheis and Barbara and baptized Apr. 30, 1763, with Andreas Russ and wife Christina as spon-

On Sept. 17, Christina, daughter of Mattheis and Barbara Hollepeter was born. She was baptized Apr. 4, 1768 with Frederick Russ and wife Christina as sponsors

On November 9, 1769 Friderich Hallepeter was born (in the evening) to Mattheis Hallepeter and Barbara with Friderick and Christina Russ, grandparents, as sponsors.

We do not know why the records of the baptisms of the children born later

were not found.

Mentioned in the will are these children: Mary, Susannah, Christina, Bar-

bara, John, Frederick, Matthias Jr., Andrew and Abraham.

Since we were unable to secure any information about the daughters, other than Mary married Peter Stickle, and Susannah married John Green, we do not know anything about their descendants. We presume that Catherina died, because she is not mentioned in the will. We were able to find descendants of all the sons. It would have been gratifying if all'our letters of inquiry had brought

replies, so that our records might have been more complete.

In 1770 Matthias was Collector of Warrington Township, York Co., Pa. In this document his name is spelled "Holliper". (Record of York County Historical

In 1776 he was appointed Constable of Warrington Township, and in this

connection we found the following document:

"York County ss: January Session: 1778, The Grand Inquest for the County of York upon their oaths and solemn affirmations, respectively do present that Matthias Hollopeter, late of Warrington Township, in the county aforesaid, yeoman, on the twenty-fifth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy six and long before was an inhabitant and residing within the Township aforesaid in the County aforesaid and an able person to serve the Office of Constable for the same township and, he, the said Matthias Hollopeter on the said twenty fifth day of March in the year aforesaid at the courthouse in the Town of York there situate lawfully and in due manner was chosen, nominated and appointed by Martin Eckleberger, Esquire and his associates, Justices of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the County aforesaid, and usually present at the appointment of Constable for the Township aforesaid, in the said County, for one year, from thence next following to do and execute all, and singular, those things which belong to the office of Constable and that the said Matthias Hollopeter afterward, to wit, in the second day of April in the year aforesaid, at the Township aforesaid, in the County aforesaid, had due notice thereof and on the — day of — in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven, was required by Robert Stevenson Esquire then, and yet, one of the Justices of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvana assigned to been the peace in the County of and also to been and determine assigned to keep the peace in the County of and also to hear and determine divers Felonies, Trespasses and other misdeeds in the said County on the same - day of — in the year aforesaid to serve a summons upon a certain Frederick Asper and sundry other persons. Nevertheless the said Matthias Hollopeter his duty in that behalf not regarding but contriving and intending wholly to neglect to serve the said Office of Constable after he, the said Matthias Hollopeter was so appointed and chosen into the said office as aforesaid to wit on the said twenty-fifth day of March in the year aforesaid and continually afterwards until

the Day of the taking of this Inquisition at the Township aforesaid in the County, aforesaid, unlawfully and contemptuously did refuse, and still doth refuse to serve the Process, aforesaid, or in any wise to execute the Office of Constable for the Township, aforesaid, to the great damage and hindrance of Justice in contempt of the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to the evil example of all others, in the like case offending and against the peace and dignity of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania."

Signed) Jonathan Serjant, Attorney General.

The decument is endorsed as "a True Bill". The defendant being charged in open court, pleads not guilty and for trial, puts himself upon his country. The case was tried at the January term of the Court of Quarter Session, and Hollopeter was found guilty, and fined 25 £. (Quarter Sessions Docket 11, page 5).

A new Constable appears for Warrington Township at the next session of the Quarter Sessions. We were not able to learn the charge against Frederick Asper, which required a summons to be served. The year was a year of the Revolutionary War, and the citizens of Pennsylvania were more reluctant than the citizens of any other colony to engage actively in the War. Frederick Asper had an original land grant, and was a neighbor of Matthias.

He and his son, John, were the local blacksmiths.

Matthias must have been thrifty for records state that he purchased 125% acres of land from Henry Clark on April 26, 1770, for which he paid five hundred and fifty pounds, and on the same day and of Mr. Clark, bought 944 acres for which he paid one hundred pounds. On March 10, 1784 he bought three tracts of land, one of 152 acres, another of 132 acres, and 50 perches, and a third of 48 acres and 100 perches, for which he paid thirteen hundred pounds. This land is on the map of the York County original land grants, and is South and East of the first land for which he received a grant, and places his holdings nearer the Susquehanna River. His holdings at this time totaled 552 acres.

After the Revolutionary War the British colonies became states and each state made its tax lists. The first list made in Pennsylvania was in 1779, and the name of Matthias is in that list which is found in Pennsylvania Archives, printed under the direction of David Martin, Secretary of the Commonwealth of Warrington Township, York County.

The list is as follows, and the name Hollopeter has various spellings.

1779—Matthias Holopeter—200 acres—26 cattle. Tax 384.0.0.

1789—Matthias Hollowpeter—200 acres—5 horses, 30 cattle. Tax 326.2.6. 1780—Matthias Hollowpeter —220 acres, 4 horses, 20 cattle. Tax 20.1.2. 1782—Matthias Hollopeter —232 acres, 10 cattle, 4 horses. Tax 17.

1783-Matthias Hollopeter-230 acres, household 8-no servants or colored people."

After his name in the list of 1781 is found a small letter s. Letters were used as abbreviations for name of certain things or occupations. The s in this instance, designated that Matthias possessed a still. This was not unusual in those days, and was used to appease Indians, and for medicine, but it caused the large tax assessed. Matthias was the largest taxpayer in Warrington Town-

The first official census of the United States was made in 1790, but was inaccurate. The name of Matthias was not given.

A letter, dated December 1, 1953, from Mr. Kilbourne, Librarian of the York County Historical Society, is as follows:

"Last spring I was a member of a party that had the exciting experience of finding a forgotten graveyard in York County, or, to be more precise, in Warrington Township. Among the stones remaining in the plot was that of Matthias Hollopeter. The burying ground is in very bad condition, and Matthias' stone is very weatherworn. The inscription, as far as we could decipher it was, 'Matthias H. yeloPeter, died May 1799, aged 71 years'. I believe the original inscription was in German. On the stone, at the top is this—Hier ligt Beg Raben (here lies the body of).

"This cemetery is known as the Bentz Burying Ground', and is on the Norman Cook farm in Warrington Township. The plot is unfenced, and cows and groundhogs have overturned many stones. Before long the plot will be lost, hence

our interest in copying the stones. You will note that if its present condition allowed us to interpret it properly as to its markings, this Matthias was born in

In 1954 Col. Hugh Carnahan, retired, visited the grave. He is a member of the family. He was kind enough to send directions of route to the grave from

Directions: Drive north out of York on the State Highway 74, through Dover, Rossville and Wellsville. From the Post Office Building of Wellsville continue north on 74 for 1.9 miles to the crest of a hill with one stone and one frame house on the left and one frame house and a frame abandoned filling station on the right. Turn right on a narrow paved road for .5 mile to a white house with white barn and outbuildings. Just this side of the buildings the first gravel road turns left down over a hill. Follow this .4 mile to the foot of the hill. Just short of a run a gravel road comes in from the right, with two houses on it. Turn right on it. The first mail box reads "F. Diller". At the end of the road 4 mile is the Norman Cook farm, stone residence, big red barn and outbuildings with white silo. About 4 mile up the hill and in front of the barn, in the center of the plot, about 15 ft. in, is a rough local sandstone much weathered, leaning slightly to the front. It is a slab 4"-6" thick, 20" wide and now standing about 24" above the ground. The top is indented an inch from each side and then rounded. It is much weathered to the front and in the center part, destroying the inscription in some part.

In 1955 Calvin Hollopeter of Big Run, Pennsylvania, visited the grave of Matthias. He re-set the stone and traced the letters with aluminum paint. In the photograph which he took the 1799 date does not seem very clear, but we know that that was the year Matthias died. His death was caused by cholera. From old letters we learned that he was a man of large physique, and that all his sons, but one, had this characteristic.

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF MATTHIAS HOLLOPETER

I, MATTHIAS HOLLOPETER of Warrington Township in the County of York and State Pennsylvania being sick and weak in Body but of Sound disposing Mind and Memory, do Make and ordain this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following, viz. It is my will and desire that my Just debts and

funeral Expences be first paid.

I Give and Bequeath to my daughter Mary Stickel the sum of one hundred pounds lawful Money of Pennsylvania to be paid in four equal payments the first actual payment to be at the expiration of three years after my decease, and thence yearly till the whole shall be fully paid. I Give and bequeath unto my Daughter Susanna Green the Sum of fifty pounds like money aforesaid to be paid at the Expiration of Seven Years after my Deccase. I Give and Bequeath to my daughter Christiana Hollopeter the Sum of One hundred pounds like Money abovesaid to be paid in four equal Payments the first to be at the Expiration of eight years after my decease and thence one payment yearly, till the whole shall be fully paid. I Also Give and Bequeath to my said Daughter Christiana a good horse Creature and Saddle, Two Cows, eight Sheep, a Case of drawers & a good Bed and Bedding. I Give and Bequeath to my daughter Barbara Hollopeter the sum of One hundred pounds like Money abovesaid to be paid in four equal Payments, the first payment to be made at the expiration of twelve years after my Decease, and thence yearly till the whole Shall be fully paid. I also Give and Bequeath unto my said Daughter Barbara a good horse Creature and Sadle, two Cows, eight Sheep, a Case of Drawers, and a good Bed and Bedding. But not-withstanding if my said Daughters Christiana and Barbara or either of them shall behave themselves indiscreetly, and Marry Contrary to their mother's desire, they shall then only receive Fifty pounds like Money abovesaid for their full share of my Estate. I Give and Bequeath to my Beloved Wife Barbara Hollopeter the sum of One Hundred pounds like money abovesaid to be paid in four equal payments, the first on demand, and the remaining payments as she shall desire them. I also Give and Bequeath to my said Wife One good horse and two Cows and keeping for them to be kept up during the natural life, a Saddle and Bridle, a Table, an Iron pot, a Wheel and such of the Kitchen Ware and furniture as she shall think necessary, also her Bed, Bedsteads and Bedding and also Ten pounds of Clean flax & Eight pounds of Wool yearly and every year during her natural life as she shall require it. I also Give and Bequeath unto my said Wife as long as she continues my Widow an ample and sufficient maintenance both in

diet and Apparel and every other necessary Suitable to her age and Circumstances of health and also her Liberty and Choice in and of my present dwelling house and any apartment thereof and also nursing and attendance when Sick. I Give and Bequeath to my Son John Hollopeter the Sum of five pounds - lawful money of Pennsylvania. It is my will and desire that my Lands and Chattles be kept entire until the Consideration money of my upper Tract be fully paid and until my Son Mathias arrives to the age of twenty one years and that my family which now lives with me Continues to live together and unite to take the best method and make the best use of my said lands & Chattles for the discharging said Debt. And when my said Son Mathias shall arrive to the age of twenty one years it is my Will that a Just Estimate or Valuation of my Said Lands and Chattels be made, and that my upper plantation be divided into two parts equal in Value, and that a good new house be erected on that division of it which shall have none at the Joint & equal expense of the two of my Sons whose lot and Choice it is to be the possessor of each of said divisions and that the present Orchard be for the Joint & equal use of the said possessors until there is an Orchard sufficient to bear on the division which shall have none-It is my will and desire that my real Estate and such of my personal as is not herein before disposed of be equally divided among my five Sons John Hollopeter, Frederick Hollopeter, Matthias Hollopeter, Andrew Hollopeter, in the following manner. viz. I Give and devise to my son Frederick the tract of Land wherever I now live to him, his heirs and assigns forever, he taking the necessary care and Charge of my said wife, and provided also that he Justly and truly pay the difference betwixt his true Share of my Estate, and the value of the Tract of land hereby devised to him my said Son Frederick for the use of such of my Sons whose lot or Choice it is not to inherit any part of my land. And if my Son John will accept of his Share of my Estate in land that he shall have the preference or first Choice of either the divisions of my upper Tract of Land, on Condition of his paying the excess of the Value of the same above his equal Share of my Estate for the use of such of my Sons as shall get no land To Hold to him my said Son John his heirs and Assigns forever. I Give and devise the other division of my upper Tract of Land unto my Son Matthias his heirs and Assigns forever he also paying the excess of the value thereof above his Share of my Estate to the use of my other Sons as gets no Share of my Land as aforesaid, but in Case my Son John does not accept of his Share of my Estate in land, then it is my will and desire that then my son Matthias shall have the preference or first Choice as aforesaid and also that then my Son Andrew shall have the other part in the same manner as abovesaid. And it is my Will and desire that the eldest of my two Sons whose Lot it shall be not to inherit any part of my Land shall receive Fifty pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania within one year after the Valuation of my Estate above mentioned, and thence yearly and every year the Sum of fifty pounds till the whole shall be paid. It is my Will and desire that my Son Abraham shall receive the Sum of Fifty pounds like money abovesaid When he shall arrive to the full age of Twenty one Years and thence yearly the said Sum of fifty pounds until his whole Share be fully paid. It is my desire that all my Minor Children Continue to live on said Lands or Estate and be brought up accustomed to labour and Virtue, but if my Son Abraham inclines to go to a trade he may, but he must therefore receive Twenty pounds less than he otherwise would. It is also my Will and desire that if any or either of my Sons should die without Issue that then their Share of my Estate be equally divided among the rest of my Sons. I Give and bequeath to my beloved Wife my Case of Drawers, and also the remainder of my two daughters Christiana and Barbara's Share of my Estate in case they misbehave to be at her Disposal.

AND LASTLY of this my Last Will and Testament I Do Constitute and Appoint my Son Frederick Hollopeter and Elihu Underwood Esq. Executors hereby

revoking all former Wills by me made.

Frederick was the son of Matthias and the attorneyship was granted for the final settlement of his affairs in York County.

THE ROOSE (RUSZ) FAMILY

It may be interesting to some readers to learn of the family of Barbara Rusz, the wife of Matthias Hollopeter. She was the daughter of Friderick and Christina Rusz (or Roose, From now on we shall spell the name Roose, as that is the way Frederick Roose signed his will). However, in some records we find the name spelled as Ruso, Roso, Ruhs, Ruos, Rouss or Roose. (York, Pa. Historical Society)

Friderick was born Jan. 19, 1712 and came to America on the ship "Osgood" which landed at Philadelphia on Sept. 29, 1750. He took the oath of allegiance on that date (See Strassberger and Hinke, Pa. German Pioneers, Vol. I, page 445). As early as Aug. 30, 1751, Friderick Roose and wife, Christiana stood as sponsors for Anna Clauer at Lower Bermudian Union Church. He is listed among the German communicants of that church, July 30, 1758. On July 23, 1771 he and his wife were sponsors at the baptism of George Friderick Wagner, Friderick Roose d. Mar. 24, 1785, aged 73 years, 2 months and 5 days, just four days before the death of his wife Christiana. She was 69. (She was born Jan. 9, 1716). They were buried in the Bentz Burying Ground, which was also the burial place of Matthias Hollopeter, Friderick's will named four children: Andrew, Friderick Jr., Barbara

Andrew Roose was confirmed in the Lutheran Church Dec. 17, 1748. On June 22, 1762, m. Maria Catherine Klein, daughter of Philip Klein of Warrington Township. The marriage is recorded at Christ Lutheran Church, York, Pa. They were the parents of eight children:

Records show that Frederick Sr. had a large tract of land, and that his sons were land owners. (See Land Grant map.) In the Third Series of the Pennsylvant of the Pennsylvant of Pennsylvant vania Archives, Vol. 21, printed under the direction of David Martin, Secretary of the Commonwealth of Warrington Township, is found the tax lists which contain the names, holdings and tax assessments of Frederick Ruse Sr., Andrew and Frederick Ruse Jr. (Note spelling of the names here), as well as the assessments of Matthias Hollopeter. Frederick Sr. had 150 acres of land. Tax 39. 7. 8. Frederick Jr. had a tax of 8. 18. 0. Andrew Ruse had 150 acres. Tax 30. 18. 0. These lists state that the Ruses had no servants and no colored people. The letter S

was found after the name of Andrew Ruse which indicated that he had a still.

Through the Office of Register of Wills of York County, Pa., we were able to secure a copy of the Will of Barbara's father, Frederick, recorded in will book F, page 348, York County Courthouse. The name now is spelled Roose. The will is dated Dcc. 12, 1784 and was probated Apr. 12, 1785.

Their location was in what is now Adams County.

Estate of: Frederick Roose, Late of Warrington Township, York County, Pennsylvania, Deceased.

I, Frederick Roose, of Warrington Township, in the County of York and State of Pennsylvania, Yoeman being weak in body, but of sound disposing mind and memory and considering the mortality of my body do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner following that is to say. things necessary for her sustenance by night or day, also to pay to my said wife the sum of Ten Pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania, as soon as may be after my decease that is if she my said wife shall outlive me and as touching the remainder of my estate, it is my Will that the same shall be equally divided among my four children viz: Andrew, Barbara, Frederick and Rosanna allowing my said Wife Christiana to have the use of any part threat that she shall chuse during my four children viz: Andrew, Barbara, Frederick and Rosanna allowing my said Wife Christiana to have the use of any part threof, that she shall chuse during her natural life, AND LASTLY, I make ordain constitute and appoint my son Andrew and my friend Elihu Underwood Schm, executors of this my last Will and Testament in Trust for the intents and purposes in this my last Will contained and the true intents and meaning thereof.

FREDERICK HOLLOPETER

Frederick Hollopeter was born to Matthias and Barbara (Rusz) Hollopeter in York Co., Pa., on Nov. 9, 1769 ("in the evening"). He died in Clearfield Co., Pa., Sept. 13, 1838, and is buried in the cemetery at Luthersburg. According to the records of the Warrington Township Monthly Meeting, he was married to a Quaker girl, Rachel Edmundson, some time before Aug. 11, 1798. Frederick was not a Quaker, so, she was unchurched by their marriage as was the custom in those days. Frederick's parents were married in the Lutheran Church, in Han-over, Pa., so were of that faith. They were affiliated with the Lower Bermudian Union Church in Warrington Township, which was formed by the union of Lutherans with others in, what was then, a sparsely settled community. Frederick had been baptized as an infant, in this church. Not many years after his marriage, we know he became a Methodist, for he and his brother Andrew were members of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Church at Lewisbury, and were instrumental in securing land on which to build a church were instrumental in securing land on which to build a church

Frederick was a farmer, and he and his brother, Abraham, once owned adjoining farms on the West side of the Susquehanna River. Their brother, John, had a farm on the East side of the river. The trading place of Frederick and Abraham was a place called Little York. They lived near a small village called Round-Top. All of the children of Frederick and Rachel were born in York Co., Pa. The family left that county about 1827 to locate in Clearfield Co., Pa., in Union Township. Rachel died, and Frederick married a woman—whose name we did not learn—who was the mother of his youngest child, Elijah. We have no information about him. Frederick and Rachel were the parents of five children. Quite a large number of their descendants live in Clearfield Co. today, and they hold a Hollopeter Family Reunion each year. It was with Frederick that his mother, Barbara, spent her last years, after the death of her husband, Matthias. Children were:

JOHN HOLLOPETER

John Hollopeter (1766-?) was the son of Matthias and Barbara (Ruszor Roose) Hollopeter, and was born in York Co., Pa. He was a farmer and a bridge builder. We were not able to learn the family name of his wife, Mary, but learned that she was nicknamed "Polly". John's farm was on the western side of the Susquehanna River—"Not on the side with Harrisburg". We do not know how close to Harrisburg his farm was. From an old letter we learn that John did not leave York Co. with 1922, and was a farmer and a bridge not leave York Co. until 1832, so was about 64 when he went to Miami Co., O. His nine children were all born in Pa. We know that his eldest daughter did not go to Ohio, but had married and was living in Newport, Perry Co., Pa. Others of his children must have been married, too, and we do not know how many migrated to Ohio. We were not able to learn anything about some of the children but the dates of their birth. Others we have some record of.

III. Mrs. George Kenison of Vale, Ore. is a descendant of a Simon Hollopeter, b. about 1818. The census of 1856 lists him and his family as living in Marengo consisted of a wife and two daughters; the 1860 census adds four more children to the family.

There was a Simon Hollopeter, son of John E. (1793) and Elizabeth (Lesh) H. b. 1819. The names of his children do not correspond with the names of the children in the family of Simon, of Ia. In addition to the names of Simon and his family, the 1860 census carries the names of a Walter Jordan Hollopeter, a Matthias, and three others named Hollopeter, whose first names were not reported by Mrs. Kenison. The following information is from the 1860 census:

While the E. in the above mentioned Mary's name might be for "Elizabeth", the birth date does not correspond with that of her grandmother, Elizabeth Hollopeter, who was born Apr. 22, 1853. She married in 1873. A coincidence is that Elizabeth and Mary E. each had a sister Louisa and a brother Thomas. This Thomas of Elizabeth's family was captured by Indians when a lad. Years later, he located his family and visited them. He had with him his son by an Indian woman.

CHAPTER IV

MATTHIAS HOLLOPETER, JR.

It was not possible for us to obtain very much information about Matthias Hollopeter Jr. However, we were gratified that we were able to contact some of his descendants, and to receive the names of others, even though their addresses were unknown. This son of Matthias and Barbara (Rusz) Hollopeter was born in York Co., Pa., and was living there at the time of his father's death in 1799. We do not know the year of his birth, nor the name of his wife, but we know that all his children were born in York Co., and that he left there about 1830 with his family, and located in Miami Co., O. He died about 1844, and is buried in the cemetery at Covington, O. Some of his children are buried there, too, while others have a resting place near East Liberty, in Logan Co., O. Some of his descendants reside near Covington, Bellefontaine, and Lewistown, O., Richmond, Ind. and Mt. Ayr, Ia. Matthias Jr. and his wife were the parents of eight children:

In a letter written by Zilpha in 1891, she states that Matthias Jr. and his wife died shortly after she and John were married. John had a sash and door mill in Richmond, Ind. He d. In a letter from Mrs. Donald Pyers, she mentions an Ella Hollopeter (Jasques),

a sister of Israel Jerome, but an old letter from Israel Jerome does not indicate which of his sisters may have been called "Ella". Mrs. Pyers says that Mrs. Jacques had two children, Fred Jacques (deceased) and Mrs. Goldie Thatcher (Mrs. Clarence) of Bellefontaine. We wrote Mrs. Thatcher, but were not fortunate enough to have a reply.

Other names which are among the papers of this branch of the family, and which we are unable to find the connection are: Mrs. Albert Groman of Tiffin, O.; Elizabeth Rice, Thalia Brown, Aletha England, Esther Foster. Thalia Brown (Mrs. Tom) resides at Port Clinton, O.

The fourth child of Matthias Jr. was—IV. Mary Hollopeter (Weaver), no record. V. Samuel Hollopeter, no record. VI. Rebecca Hollopeter, no record. VII. Ellen Hollopeter, no record.

CHAPTER V

ANDREW HOLLOPETER

Andrew, son of Matthias and Barbara (Rusz or Roose) Hollopeter, was born in York Co., Pa., in 1777. According to records of the Monthly Meeting of the Warrington Township Society of Friends, he and Phebe, daughter of Richard and Elisabeth (Hobson) Blatchford, were married "before the twelfth of August, 1799." Phebe was a twin, and her twin sister, Margaret, was married to Andrew's brother, Abraham, in Dec. 1801. The girls were born in York Co., Aug. 18, 1782. Since The Society of Friends frowned upon marriages that were not in unity with their church, Phebe, Margaret and Rachel, wife of Frederick Hollopeter, lost their standing in the church and were excommunicated. The record states flatly that Hollopeters were not Quakers.

We learn from Gibson's History of York Co., p. 636, that Andrew and Frederick were two of a committee to which Eli Lewis granted a lot in Lewisberry for the erection of a Methodist Church, and the same information is contained in Pronell's History of York, Vol. I, p. 891. Andrew and Frederick were two of the trustees of the newly organized church. Though the ground on which to build the church was secured in 1806, the building was not erected until 1817. It was of stone, and was still functioning when present brick structure was built.

The Wesley movement spread from Baltimore, after the Christmas Meeting of 1784, so the Hollopeter brothers and their wives became Methodists 22 years after the church was established. They started a long line of adherents to the Methodist Church. We have found it surprising that there have been so many of their descendants who, down through the years, have served the church as ministers —and, in former days, as exhorters and local preachers. About the beginning of the 20th Century, four of Andrew's descendants were active in the North Indiana Methodist Conference. Frederick's branch has several members serving the Methodist Church today.

About 1824 the call of the West pulled Andrew and his family from York Co. to Wayne Co.. Ohio, where they located near Wooster. No record was found that Andrew purchased land in Wayne Co., so he may have made a living by plying the carpenter trade, which his father had taught him. A record was found of the purchase of 80 acres in Clinton Township, by Andrew's son. Abraham, who had moved to Wayne Co., at the time his father moved there, with his wife and two children. Abraham placed a mortgage on this land which he paid in 1833.

Andrew moved to Seneca Co.. O., about 1834, where he spent the rest of his days. His wife. Phebe, died Feb. 23, 1842, and his death occurred, Mar. 11, 1846, and he is buried in the beautiful Fostoria Cemetery. Phebe's grave was not found, but the body of Andrew has been moved from its original resting spot to make room for a driveway in the cemetery. Two of his grandchildren lie beside him, so their graves must have been changed too. They are Leah, daughter of Andrew's son, Abraham, b. Feb. 23; d. July 28, 1840, and a son of Andrew Jr., named Milton B., who died in 1844, at the age of six months.

Andrew and Phebe were the parents of eight children, all of whom were born in York Co., Pa. Their youngest child was two years old when they moved to Ohio. Their descendants were:

1. Abraham Hollopeter, b. May 20, 1800, m. in York Co., Pa., Nov. 18, 1819, to Lydia Myers (b. Feb. 18, 1802). Moved to Wayne Co., O. in 1824: purchased 80 acres in Clinton Township which he mortgaged, but paid in 1833. Moved from Wayne Co., to Holmes Co., O., where he was not very successful, so, after four years, moved to Seneca Co., where he resided until after his father's death, in 1846. His next home was made in Allen Co., Ind., where he bought 80 acres of school land, and after a time added 40 acres. In the book, "Pioneers of the Upper Maumee Valley", it states that Abraham 'came poor, but did well'. This was probably because he was a carpenter and cabinet maker. In a day of Township Boards he served his Township at Trustee. He was a believer in education, and saw that his children received that advantage. Abraham died in 1869, and Lydia, in 1873. They are buried in the Leo Cemetery, in Allen Co., Ind. They were the parents of ten children:

B. John Wesley Hollopeter was the son of Abraham and Lydia (Myers) Hollopeter, b. in York Co., Pa., Sept. 16, 1822. He was two years old when his parents to word to Wayne Co., O. After six years there, Abraham took his family to Holmes Co., and, four years later, moved to Seneca Co., O., where John Wesley grew to manhood. In 1845, still following the call of the West, he went to Allen grew to manhood. In 1845, still following the call of the west, ne went to Alien Co., Ind., on a prospecting trip. He found it a desirable community, so returned to Ohio to marry Virginia Welch (b. Sept. 30, 1835), and bring her to Ind. to establish a home. They were married Dec. 11, 1845. In Indiana John Wesley worked at clearing land and as a carpenter. By 1847 he was able to purchase 150 acres, but soon sold 70 acres of it. He was almost out of debt on it, when Virginia suffered a long and costly illness and died, Feb. 1852. Other misfortunes added to this experience caused him to lose his farm in Coesse Township, along with everything he owned but a team and wagon. The doctor he had had for Virginia everything he owned but a team and wagon. The doctor he had had for Virginia sued for possession of them, but the Judge refused to force John Wesley to part with them. After a time, he was able to purchase 80 acres near Leo, Ind. Here he planted ten acres as an apple orchard (old fashioned Rambos, Baldwins, Northern Spies, Bellflowers, Greenings, Russets). John Wesley and Virginia were parents of three sons, the eidest was five when Virginia died. He was determined to keep his family together. On Sept. 24, 1852, he and Mary Kaziah Zimmerman were married. She was the daughter of Isaac and Rachel (Rupp or Roup) Zimmerman, and was born in Bedford Co., Pa., Dec. 21, 1833; d. June 1, 1910. (Her father died when she was quite young, leaving three children, Mary, Samuel and Caroline Zimmerman. Rachel had a difficult time keeping her family together, so Mary was sympathetic with the problem John Wesley faced. It is of interest to note that the twin daughters of John Wesley and Mary were named for both

John Wesley and Mary were Methodists. He had become one in Ohio, in 1840. At Leo, he served for many years as a trustee of the church and parsonage and as a steward. He was a member of Masonic Lodge 224 for many years. John Wesley and Mary were the parents of 11 children; among them the compilers of

V. Andrew Hollopeter Jr.—1808-1892; b. York Co., Pa.; Lea, Ind; m. Catherine Edmonds, Sept. 18, 1832. She was a Moravian missionary, at one time. She was the fourth girl of the Edmonds family to marry Hollopeter brothers. Andrew left

Pa. with his father's family in 1824, locating in Wayne Co., O., then in Holmes and Seneca Co., before coming to Allen Co., Ind. in 1847. They established a home on a farm 2½ miles south of the Allen-DeKalb Co. line, on the east side of what is now Ind. Highway 427. Andrew Jr. and Catherine are buried in the Leo Cemetery. An article written for the newspaper by Rev. A. E. Mahin, a Presiding Elder in the North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and officiating minister at Andrew's funeral, states: "Andrew Hollopeter died at the age of 94. At sixteen he was 'born again', and at nineteen, was licensed to preach by the Rev. Russel Bigelow, in Pa. Until the weight of year compelled him to cease, he was a faithful, acceptable and beloved local preacher, both believing and practicing what he preached. He had been employed regularly as a supply preacher when young enough for such work. In 1862, when a newly formed church at New Haven was without a regular pastor, Andrew shared in the supply of that charge, before it became a point on the Harlan (Maysville) Circuit, with the Rev. Thomas Coldozer. Many who attended his funeral had found Christ under his ministry. As he passed toward the sunset days of his life, almost his sole topic of conversation was his Lord. His poor hearing made him unable to hear much of a sermon, but he continued to be faithful in his church attendance. He took special delight in the 'love-feast' and Communion. the text for his funeral sermon was, 'Looking For That Blessed Hope'. A good man has gone home to God, leaving a hallowed influence behind him."

In a book in the library at Toledo, O., is found the following information: Wesley Hollopeter took up land in London Township, — 29, 1832. He acquired land in Jackson Township, Mar. 1. Matthias Hollopeter took up some land in this same town Aug. 29, 1833, as did Andrew Hollopeter, May 11, 1833.

Isaiah Hollopeter started a town in Jackson Township; it was called ETHO-

BOTH. The town was not a success. Isaiah is not listed as a purchaser of land

in the list of titles.

A Fred Hollopeter is listed as Trustee of Jackson Township, 1851-1852. Isalah Hollopeter as Trustee, 1872; as Clerk, 1873 to 1875, and as Trustee again in 1876. John Hollopeter is listed as a Third Sergeant in the Fostoria Invincibles, organized in 1861. Then he was commissioned as a Second Lieut., then First Lieut, and in 1863-64 was a Captain. He was a Major when he was discharged.

A Captain Hollopeter is buried in the City Cemetery at Fostoria, Ohio.

STORIES OF THE FAMILY

Among the Hollopeters who settled at Leo, Indiana, prior to the Civil War, the art of repartee was developed to a high degree. A slow wit at a family

gathering was the butt of many a joke.

When one of the elder brothers lay on his death bed, a brother felt his feet and found them feverish. Hoping to cheer up the sick man he said, "You are not going to die. No one ever died with hot feet." A slow smile came over the countenance of the dying man as he gasped, "How about—John Knox?" Then he passed on to his reward sure in the faith that his brother would not have an answer to that. (John Knox was a character in Fox's Book of Martyrs who was burned at the stake by the clerical authorities of his time for professing certain and divers heretical beliefs.)

While the old M. E. College flourished it was customary for several cousins to hire a house and do their own cooking while attending the school. At one of these houses the boys were engaged in a little horseplay and ended it by picking up one of their number and dropping him from the top rail of a high rail fence. He lay there groaning until they were sure he was badly hurt. Tenderly they carried him into the house and laid him on his bed, all the time apologizing for their rude conduct. As the last one left the room he was assisted by a hearty kick from the supposedly injured member, who then barred his door for the rest of the evening.

The Andrew Hollopeter, Jr., homestead is on the east side of Indiana 427, about two miles south of the Allen-DeKalb County line. It was all woods when he moved on it. When their first rude cabin was completed, his wife Catherine took four forked sticks and drove them into the dirt floor. Across the forks she laid four cross sticks and on these a rough puncheon or split log. On top of the puncheon was spread her shawl and the family Bible on top of that. A home had been formed.

The farm of Andrew adjoined that of Little Mose Wells who had married Andrew's sister Phoebe. Little Mose was very much afraid of the dark. Whenever he visited them late in the evening the boys, Will and James, would get him telling stories and keep him busy until it was dark. Then when he could be detained no longer, they would ask him if he wanted a torch. "Yes, I believe I had better have a torch." By the time they had found materials and made a bark torch for him it would be very dark. Once on his way he lost no time, but ran down the lane and through the woods. The boys got a kick out of the speed the torch made, and the wild jumps it took over ditches and logs.

On a bitter cold winter day circuit rider Andrew was preaching in a log church. One of the good brothers came late and tiptoed in before the blazing fireplace to warm himself. He unwound his muffler, backed up to the roaring fire and gingerly spread the tails of his Sunday coat so that the heat would reach the place where it would do the most good. When he felt comfortable the seat of his trousers was just about smoking hot. He advanced with great dignity to take a seat on the puncheon benches. When he bent over the hot seat of his breeches came in contact with his buttocks. With a startled "Whoop" he leaped upward in a manner that added nothing to the dignity or decorum of the service.

One summer day Will and a neighbor boy, along with Mary Ann and her sister Tillie, went over to the creek. Here they stirred up and killed a rattle-snake. Rattlers were scarce in that part of Indiana, so the encounter had every-one's nerves on edge. On the way home the boys told the girls to stick close to them and they would protect them. Mary Ann said afterward that she had seen them whispering together before this and should have known better than to stick close to them. The boys were wearing heavy cowhide boots with their homespun trousers tucked in them, the girls the usual calico dresses and sunbonnets. When the boys with the girls crowding trustfully at their heels came through a hay field they suddenly began kicking apart a large bumble bee nest. Of course they got stung a few times but it was worth it to see the girls run toward the house, screaming and swinging their sunbonnets at the maddened bees. William got well licked for it but probably just charged that one off to education and experience.

education and experience.

Once William persuaded Mary Ann and James to hold a grain sack over a hole in a hollow log while he punched out a chipmunk so they could have it for a pet. When they were all set and he had the stick inserted in the log he remarked, "Look out, there might be yellow jackets in here." There were, and two trusting souls got well stung. Also William's education was further enlarged.

As Mary Ann grew into young womanhood she was troubled with sick spells, particularly when some disagreeable chore was coming up. If anyone spoke of going somewhere in the wagon, which was the usual mode of transportation then, she could stage a marvelous recovery. The duties of circuit rider and later "presiding eider" took Andrew and his wife away from home for several days at a time for protracted camp meetings. As they would start on these trips someone would inquire if they might invite their cousins up. "No!" "What if one of us gets sick!" "Well, in that case it might be all right." By the time the parents were out of sight Mary Ann was getting another of her spells and James was on a horse to bring up the other cousins to take care of her. Scheduled farm work suffered while this house party went on.

The contemporary Mathias Hollopeter used to say: "When Mary Ann cooked at the old fireplace, the first thing she did was make the coffee and then set it aside: then she fried the potatoes and set them to one side. Lastly she fried the meat and the meal was ready. The meat was hot, the potatoes barely warm and the coffee stone cold."

When the Civil War came on, James then eighteen enlisted in the 11th Indiana Volunteer Infantry, the first of the three regiments raised by Lew Wallace for the Union. James related to me that when the regiment was first assembled they were in a tent camp in the summer time. One night after taps Company D did not fee! like going to sleep, a condition frequent with young soldiers. They brayed, crowed, barked and imitated all the animals they could think of. Colonel Wallace strode down to the company street and in his best military manner dressed them down. All was quiet. He turned to leave and had taken a few steps when a slight noise caused him to look around. About twenty men in

their shirttails were following him on their hands and knees. Without a word he stamped to their Captain's tent. "Captain, where did you get your men," he

barked.
"Ft. Wayne, sir," said the startled Captain sitting bolt upright in bed at the

Later the 11th Indiana was included in the occupation forces under Maj. Gen. Ben Butler that took over New Orleans on its surrender to the navy. Butler's administration of military law to the captured city caused the north to have divided opinions of him for the rest of his life. The high spirited Creoles had only one opinion of him and his men, and that was bad. They would have preferred Lucifer and all his angels, to this fiend and his blue-bellied minions. Off duty, James and his comrade were strolling in the city and paused at the dining room window of the St. Charles Hotel. The delicious strawberries in the window appealed to their ration-weary stomachs. On entering they were served courteously enough, but on leaving they were charged \$1.00 each. They paid without batting an eye and got out as quickly as they could. At that time \$1.00 in Leo would have fed a farm hand for the better part of a week.

William enlisted in Company C 88th Indiana Volunteer Infantry as a sergeant and was promoted through the ranks to Captain. The final muster roll of that regiment bears the remark after his name, "Discharged for disability from wounds." On one occasion the regiment was on the front line during a stable

Finally William volunteered to take the post. After midnight the moon came out. In a little while a hog started grunting and rooting, working slowly toward him. He thought this a little peculiar for a hog to be feeding at this time of night, so he covered it with his rifle and challenged once. The hog kept grunting and working closer. At the crack of his rifle it stopped. In the morning a man wrapped up in a hog skin, with a gun strapped to his back was found dead

in front of the post. No more sentries were killed on this post.

In her later years Mary Ann fell and broke her hip. It never healed so she had to use crutches for the rest of her life. This did not prevent her visiting her

nieces and cousins a week at a time. During the harvest time the stress of this entertaining on a busy farm wife was a slight strain. Still they bore up under it nobly, considering it just another cross to bear. At that she was a grand old lady of another day and other customs. From her I learned many things about the family that I would never have known otherwise for she was a good story teller.

Most of the older members of the family are buried in the cemetery at Leo, in the old part. Many of their descendants are interred in the new part, some of their bodies having been shipped from a distance to lie in this consecrated spot. A visit here is always an inspiration to meet your troubles with the steady courage they met their personal and national emergencies. After an hour of meditation brought on by the names on the stones, the memories and traditions of these cheerful, kindly people, you can say with the Irish, "God rest their souls.

I add this story told many times in the family about Andrew Jr., the Methodist Circuit Rider. He rode his horse from one log cabin to another to pray with the families for the necessities of life. On one occasion one of his charges prayed, "O Lord send us a barrel of salt, O Lord send us a barrel of pepper; Good God, Lord, that's too much pepper."

CHAPTER VI

ABRAHAM HOLLOPETER

Abraham Hollopeter, son of Matthias and Barbara (Rusz) Hollopeter, was born in York County, Pa. in 1780. He was married on Dec. 10, 1801, to Margaret Blatchford, who was a twin sister of Phebe, wife of his brother, Andrew. The following is a copy of the marriage certificate of Abraham and Margaret which was sent to Bronton S. Hollopeter in 1902 by their son, Jeseph Hollopeter of was sent to Brenton S. "To all persons to whom these presents come, greetings. Be it known unto you that on the tenth day of December, 1801, A.D., Margaret Blatchford and Abraham Hollopeter, both of Warrington Township, in the County of York, in the State of Pennsylvania, were joined together in wedlock by me in the presence of the underwritten witnesses-

Abraham and Margaret were the parents of five children, all of whom were born in York County, Pa .:

Among the papers of Brenton S. Hollopeter was found a letter from Joseph Hollopeter, the youngest son of Abraham Sr. It carries much interesting infor-

mation, and is as follows:

"I was born on a farm in York Co., Pa., as were all my brothers and sisters. Our farm was near a place called Round-top and our trading center was Little York. About the year 1827, my father, Abraham Hollopeter, sold our farm and took our family out West, to Michigan in covered wagons, a trip of 900 miles. Not liking the place, he soon turned around and traveled the same road back Not liking the place, he soon turned around and traveled the same road back again. We landed (or stranded) in Northumberland. At any rate, Father left mother and children there, and he returned to York County alone. We never saw him again, for he took very sick, went blind, and died. He is buried in York County. My mother and we children continued to live in Northumberland. Mother died in 1841, and is buried there.

Joseph continues, "My brother, Abraham Jr., married Margaret Crothers (b. Jan. 1, 1812; d. May 8, 1872), on April 5, 1831. Abraham Jr. died in Clinton County, Pa., April 27, 1873, and is buried there. They were the parents of eight

children. (Listed later).

My sister Phebe, was married to William Sanner, and was left a widow when quite young, and remained a widow for forty years. She died in 1880. They were the parents of three children, two of whom, a son, William, and a daughter, Hannah, died in childhood. Their daughter, Elisabeth Sanner, married Brooks Leighbow of Woodland County, Pa. They were the parents of two children, Mary

My sister, Elisabeth, married John Hine. In 1839 she died in giving birth to a son, John Hine Jr. Her husband died soon after, leaving the child an orphan at a very early age. All trace of him has been lost."

She mentioned Matthias Jr., Frederick, John, Andrew and two girls, Barbara and Anne. I do not know where Matthias Jr. went, but Andrew, who married my mother's twin sister. Phobo moved to Ohio Tanana Anna Market Matthias Jr. mother's twin sister, Phebe, moved to Ohio. I am named for Aunt Phebe. Once Andrew came to Pennsylvania to get Grandmother and one of my aunts to take to Ohio to visit them. Uncle John lived on the other side of the Susquehanna River from us. Grandmother Hollopeter lived in the house with Frederick, on a farm which adjoined ours, until she died. Grandfather died before I was born.
